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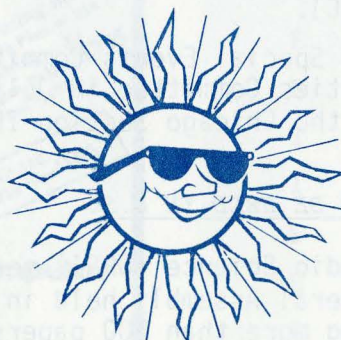

CONGRESS CONSIDERS SEVERAL VERSIONS OF REGULATORY REFORM

Several approaches to regulatory reform which faltered during the last Congress have been reintroduced this year. The principal sponsor of the administration's version is Sen. Paul Laxalt (R., Nev.), who noted (in introducing S. 1080) that regulatory reform is "a broad and imprecise term." The principal feature of the Laxalt bill is the requirement that agencies, such as the Environmental Protection Agency, describe and analyze the benefits and costs, as well as other effects, of each new regulation. Laxalt pointed out that it codifies Mr. Reagan's Executive Order (No. 12291) that required a regulatory impact analysis for all new regulations.

The principal co-sponsor is Sen. Patrick Leahy (D., Vt.). The list of 69 co-sponsors includes Sen. Jack Schmitt, whose approach to reform is through the "legislative veto," and Sens. Dale Bumpers, Ted Kennedy, Strom Thurmond and Robert Byrd.

Another approach to reform, which is espoused by Sen. Dale Bumpers, is through judicial review. The Bumpers solution, which provides for court review of agency decisions, is incorporated in the Laxalt bill. The new language directs the courts to play a more active role in policing regulatory power by closely construing statutes that transfer regulatory authority to administrators.

On the House side, hearings have begun on a measure sponsored by Rep. George Danielson (D., Calif.), who chairs an administrative law subcommittee. H.R. 746 — not as strict as the administration's approach — provides that regulators must consider the impact on the economy of proposed rules, but they are not required to perform detailed cost-benefit analyses.
